#### November Board Minutes By Tony Nader

#### Lauren

She opened by thanking Delyth, Mary Alice & Johanna for their contributions to the Fundraiser and Visioning. Lauren will continue to focus on promoting the Benefit Concert/ Fundraiser in our Sunday announcements.

In the interim, she has offered the Webmaster position to Becky. Bob Hopkins has accepted the position of Volunteer Coordinator.

She is considering using Mail Chimp for a year-end solicitation for the Center. This would help compensate for the shortfall in Special Offerings and Rental Income this year.

#### **Kevin Gilson**

He reported on the Leadership Meeting. Here is the full copy of his report:

#### Roaring 20's Program – Mary Alice

Mary Alice is on track to provide 3 Community Visioning sessions with the first on November 18, "Imagining What Could Be."

### Sound Technician Committee – Jill and Scott

Jill and Scott presented a detailed discussion of the status of the sound equipment. Scott noted that the large center speaker suspended in the Sanctuary ceiling failed and he and Jill procured replacement speakers. These will be mounted on the wall by Rod in the near future (11/26) and cable routing will be established after that for all equipment to simplify troubleshooting. The amplifier will be located in the corner where drums are now stored. Scott tweaked the sound system to improve its performance. He noted that about \$1800 worth of his own equipment is currently at the Center on loan, including the soundboard. Jill will coordinate the creation of a list of all sound equipment owned by the Center and on-loan.

A program to raise funds for ongoing replacements needs to be established. To that end, Scott is planning a fundraiser for the sound system on May 29, 2018. He has several performers lined up. The ongoing sug-

gestion is for each event to be assessed a small amount (e.g., 2%) that will go to the sound system replacement fund.

The time to set-up the sound system for performers has been inadequate. Special Music Sunday performers need to arrive at the Center at 10:00 am, sound system set-up needs to start not later than 10:15 am with the goal of completing the set-up by 10:30 am. An issue is the conflict with the needs of the Choir. Scott and Jill will meet with the Ministerial Team in mid-January to discuss the set-up timeline for Sunday Service performers and Jill will coordinate with Dawn.

Jill noted that she is requesting to be replaced as Sound Committee Chair by April 2018 for Café 704 support.

#### Café 704 – Al

The December Café will be a fundraiser for the Center. Alaura is recruiting musicians for the event. Donations for fundraising are completed and a brochure describes the offerings. Tickets are available. Regarding raffle winners, the Board will be approached to determine the policy regarding eligibility of people to win a prize.

#### Artisan 704 – Annie

Additional artisans continue to be recruited for the Artisan 704 Sunday to be held on December 17 following the Service.

#### **Greeters Committee - Randall**

There continues to be too many times that commitments have not been met. A new schedule was created and continues to be evaluated. Greeter replacements for no-shows are done on an as needed basis at the Center.

#### Welcome Committee - Bob

Similar problems with commitments are showing up. Replacements are recruited on Sundays from members present.

#### Volunteer Coordinator

Kevin resent the job descriptions to the current Leadership Team membership. Due to pressing discussions, the topic was discussed and copies of the position description were distributed for discussion. Noted were 3 different

needs: standing committees (pot luck, etc.), operating committees (caring committee), and special committees (fundraising events). This will be further discussed at the December meeting.

#### Other Business - Delyth

The Kickshaw Theater contract continues in progress.

There will be a benefit concert at Café 704 on December 9. A team is seeking items for the raffle with the kickoff at the October 29th QCC. It will be a 3-hour event from 7 to 10 pm. Discussion regarding the way to qualify people who are eligible to win raffle prizes was briefly discussed and will be taken off-line by Mary Alice. The Halloween Party was a success. The SWOT exercise, started at the November Leadership Team meeting, was displayed but not addressed. Kevin will send out a copy for consideration and discussion at the December meeting.

#### **Mary Alice**

She reported that the Visioning workshop went well. We had 14 people in attendance. People want the process reported - we'll type up the flip charts. She has resources for the next meeting, which is on January 20, 2018 for "Dreaming".

#### Delvth

We have targeted \$3k to be raised at our Fundraiser. She had a suggestion: Have a board member speak at services about our Sunday collection and what it supports (to help raise awareness and promote for contributions). Another suggestions was to have uplifting music played at collection time.

A \$250 gift basket was donated for our raffle. All pre-sold concert tickets will be eligible to win in a drawing. There was one motion made by Lindsey, 2nd - Marlena, the board unanimously approved to contribute to the Interfaith Roundtable of Washtenaw County

Our next board meeting is December 17, 2017.

## SO YOU THINK YOU KNOW SQUIRRELS?

National Squirrel Appreciation Day is January 21

Squirrels. They're everywhere. There's so many of them you kind of block them out after a while. Then one day you're driving along minding your own business, and suddenly one of the furry felons sprints across the road right in front of your car. It's almost like he was actually WAITING for YOUR car so he could give you a heart attack as you desperately try to avoid squashing him without causing an accident! What was that little maniac THINKING, anyway?

Prepare to be amazed.

My apartment is in prime squirrel habitat on the eastern edge of Ford Lake. Occasionally we see Red and Gray Squirrels; but big, flashy Fox Squirrels are in charge. Some of them have decided I'm friendly and harmless; but they're still wary of other humans, which is a Good Thing. Their relationships with dogs are, of course, the stuff of legend. Everyone within a mile knows when my neighbors bring their Shih Tzu outside. A couple of the squirrels perch on a tree outside his door and dare Sparty to try and catch them. I honestly believe that he adores these trash talk tournaments, and that all his blustering braggadocio and slobbering rage are part of his personal fitness program!

#### Nothing Beats NUTS For Fine Dining

We have lots of black walnut trees where I live, and squirrels LOVE the nuts. Unfortunately, walnuts are encased in a tough green husk when they fall from the tree and gnawing through the husk and then the shell to get to the nut meat takes up valuable time and energy. So the squirrels bury the walnuts in the loose soil of my flower bed, then dig them up months later. By that time, the pesky husk has rotted away.

Squirrel-ologists at UC Berkeley offered fox squirrels several very different kinds of nuts. The squirrels toted the nuts home and went through them with all the concentration of a trick-or-treater organizing his candy loot. They separated the almonds, walnuts, hazelnuts and peanuts with the piles organized according to size, quality and (presumably) how well they liked each kind. Finally, the nuts were transferred to several nests which featured different storage conditions. Splitting up the food stashes helps make sure that even if some of the nuts are stolen, there will still be plenty left; and the process of organizing helps the squirrels recall exactly what they've got where.

#### **Home Sweet Home**

Tree cavity dens are choice real estate in the squirrel

world, but you're more likely to spot leaf nests (dreys) in trees this time of year -- yesterday I counted eleven just at one corner of our property. Each squirrel builds several dreys in his or her territory, and uses them to get out of the rain, to hide before a hawk spots them, to stash some snacks, and for naps. Designs range from simple platforms to sophisticated "condos" so well-built they can last for years. Gnomes, who are great travelers, often spend the night in a cozy squirrel nest. They'll repay their host with fresh gossip and special treats they've picked up along the way or perhaps an herbal remedy for an ailing baby or arthritic elder.

#### Bird Feeders: Lumosity for Squirrels

"Squirrel proof" bird feeders are popular with those who wish to feed only birds, and who are not amused by a squirrel's ability to outthink fancy feeder designs. Fortunately, this blatant anti-squirrellism is balanced by an equally vast array of feeders that offer squirrels nourishing food via inventive contraptions which both diners and their hosts enjoy. "Hurry and finish, then go get my nuts. I'll wait right here."

And as the disgusted squirrel watched her leave, she distinctly heard him add: "Idiot!"

Whether we consider squirrels to be charming neighbors or potential sources of food and fur, they have a unique ability to captivate and inspire humans. By simply going through their daily lives, they remind us of the importance of balancing work and play, rest and activity to save for the future while living in the moment; and that the world offers so much more than the structures of our daily routines.
