A Spirit-Led Vision for Our New Senior Minister

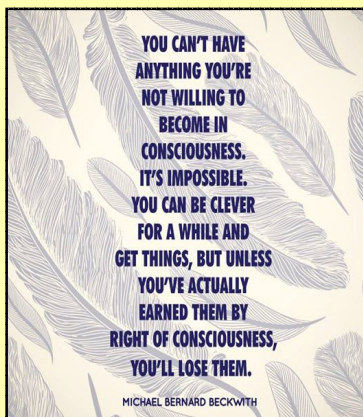
The Ministerial Search Committee is excited to invite everyone to a series of Visioning Events in March to co-create the Vision for our New Senior Minister. Please mark your calendars for Friday evenings, March 11 and 25; and Tuesday evenings, March 15 and 29. Plan to come *at least* once. We want everyone to participate!

These special gatherings will include a lasagne and salad dinner (\$5 donation) and a chance to work intimately with Spirit in our Ministerial Search. The Friday night events will begin with a 6 p.m. dinner and Visioning from 7 to 8:30. On Tuesdays, we'll crash the weekly 6 p.m. potluck—again, with a lasagne dinner if desired—and we'll Vision together from 7 to 8:30 p.m. The Visioning itself lasts for about 30 minutes. 'Harvesting' the Vision will take a little longer. More on that later.

Why are we doing this?

Well, partly because the Interfaith Center is uniquely democratic compared to a typical church or temple. Members' struggles and inspiration guide much of what we learn on Sundays via Spiritual Readings, Guided Meditations, and comments offered during Open Mic. Our Quarterly Conversations in Community are similarly participatory.

These ways of being allow us to really 'see' one another. We experience truth in the old saying that the whole is more than just the sum of its parts. Thus, it just makes sense to



co-create this significant transition in the life of our community.

Additionally, Visioning will move the Center into an entirely different level of discernment regarding the Ministerial Search. That's because it applies spiritual principles to the search process. Intrigued? Read on.

We speak often at the Center about how *our consciousness creates our reality*. Many of us use tools like prayer, meditation, ceremony, or contemplation to transcend ordinary reality and palpably sense the Divine. The Ministerial Search Committee's job is to develop **structures** that will help us find our new leader (things like surveys, ads, a job announcement, etc.). But it is our **community's consciousness** that will ultimately attract our new leader to the Center.

Visioning helps us, with a series of meditative questions, to attune our consciousness to *the Divine* in order to recognize our new minister. What hints can we download from

Infinite Intelligence about who is most ideally suited to lead us following Dave's retirement?

One more thing... let's be honest. No matter what opportunities arise with this transition, fears arise too. Fear is a natural human response to change. When we can't see what's coming, we tend to contract into hardened ideas about what *should* come. Yet, contraction is not a state in which we are open to leadings from Spirit. It is the opposite of openness. It locks us into opinions based what is familiar and comfortable. Ironically, a key quality of spiritual energy is *movement*. Spirit is *evolutionary*.

Thus, Visioning is not only about receiving and harvesting Spirit's guidance through each of us; it is also a time to honestly name our fears. We cannot release that which remains unspoken. Speaking our fears loosens their grip on us, helps us to understand one another better, and allows us to move through the change process with greater freedom. We are inspired, edified, and better able to support one another during this time of not-yet-knowing.

The Visioning Process was developed by Reverend Michael Beckwith of the [Agape Spiritual Center](#), in Los Angeles. We'll be led by Michelle Schrag, a practitioner for the Centers for Spiritual Living (Science of Mind), whose experience as a Visioning leader at the Bodhi Center in Chicago is inspiring. You are going to love her!

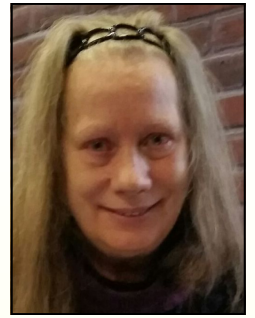

Much like the oppressive laws and social mores that have been used to restrict the freedom of minorities in virtually every corner of the world, religions have convinced many that they are miserable sinners and subjected them to the terror of judgment day and eternal damnation. God, as reflected in Walsch's writing, says flatly that there is no sin, that we are totally free, and that there is no possibility of judgment. Assuming that is true, and I certainly believe it is, there quite literally is absolutely nothing to fear. The clear result of dropping such terror-laden notions is to free the soul from worry and stress. It is easy to imagine a soul exclaiming, with great fervor and joy, "free at last, free at last, great God, I'm free at last." What a difference it would make in the world, if all souls were freed from the oppression of an imagined judgmental God. There would be no strife between religious factions, as all would know that all paths lead home. There would be no laws based on an ancient concept of "God's laws." There simply are no such laws. There would be no basis for treating some differently, based upon sexual preference or identity. I expect to have a couple of lessons based upon this concept when I return.

Spring training is underway down here. Spring cannot be far behind.

You can grab a long hug and some conversation with her after our meetings on Sunday. I invite you take the time to do that to get know her.

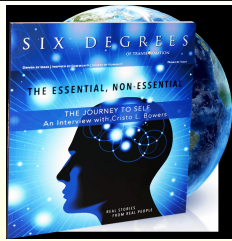

January Board Meeting Summary

The Board of Trustees meeting on February 21 included two visitors from the community and Kevin Gilson who serves as the board's volunteer consultant.

There was discussion about developing a "safe church" policy which would include (but not be limited to) child-care workers and weapons. One of the reasons this topic is being addressed at this time is that such a policy is necessary for a "Profile" of ICSG. The Profile is being prepared by the Ministerial Search Committee to inform potential candidates about who we are, what we believe, how we function, and one of the questions being asked (on the model template being used) is "Does your church have a safe church policy?" This discussion led to the question, "Do we also need an anti-discrimination policy?" Board member Rob Fagerlund, meeting visitor Joy, and perhaps community member Bonnie Dede will form a subcommittee to work on drafting these policies.

Board member Lindsay Passmore, who is also on the Ministerial Search Committee, has provided sample policies from other spiritual centers. Board member Danielle Cassetta offered to provide the documents from her preschool. Visitor Joy also has policies available. The subcommittee will present drafts for board consideration at the March and April meetings, to be finalized at the May meeting. Board consultant Kevin Gilson offered to help with the creation of a brief charter for the subcommittee -- which will be considered by the board via email.

Another topic was the workload of Administrator Delyth Balmer and how it is negatively impacted by requests and assignments from the board which are not prioritized. A motion was made and unanimously approved that "The board is responsible to discuss resource requirements and task priority when generated by the board. The task-executing committee is responsible to voice how this affects workload."

-Deep Springs events start here this month. This is a rental arrangement.

-Fire inspection soon. Volunteer opportunity: help to clean the attic.

-January was a good financial month with special donations and rental income from Kickshaw.

-We are now participating in "Amazon Smile" which will generate 5% of purchases. Stand by for details. There is a request that half of those proceeds go to the Caring Committee. Pending a decision, the board asked for a report about the expenses incurred by the the Caring Committee.

-Minister Dave Bell is checking into the availability of a piece of land on the north side of Ann Arbor and considering approaching our community to assess interest in purchasing it.

-Board members recently met with the Ministerial Search Committee, the Compensation (Think Outside the Box) Team and others. Please refer to Lindsay Passmore's report on the front page, which also includes information about Visioning Opportunities available to the community this month.

-Discussion ensued about the need to offer the next minister a "creative" compensation package due to limited financial resources.
