In honor of Dave Bell's retirement, the creation of a video by Patti Dallas, a new resident of Ann Arbor, is completed which includes interviews with Dave and our new senior minister, Lauren Tatarsky. There are also clips from past services, comments from community members, and music.

After seeing a presentation of Patti's video work, Sue Booker asked her if she would consider producing a video about Dave and the center. After attending a couple of Sunday services, Patti became interested herself in the Center, and liked the idea of creating the video. Patti and Delyth met to discuss what might be included in the project, and how to cover the cost of production. They decided the DVD's would be made available for sale, with part of the sales used to compensate Patti, and a portion going toward the ICSG Building Fund. This was approved by the Board of Trustees at the Board Meeting on May 21st, 2017.

After being the coordinator of the public access station in Yellow Springs, Ohio for several years, Patti began producing videos on her own. Her focus has been community and family historical portraits, a few samples of which can be viewed on her website,

www.pattidallas.com. Earlier in her career, she and another singer produced several audio recordings and a video for young children under their own label, Golden Glow Music goldenglowmusic.com. This month we honor Norah Reilly for the beautiful book she created for Dave Bell's retirement. Norah is a talented and creative photographer. She began her interest in photography while on an exchange trip to the Loire region of France when she graduated high school. Norah remembers using a disc camera (how many of us remember that camera?) and taking many, many pictures. She was inspired by this amazingly beautiful area and by the photographs she took.

Norah describes her current passion for macro photography of wild flowers. She takes extreme close-ups of them, going into the center where you can see the important parts of the flower; stamen, pistils and smaller insect organisms that most of us miss when observing a flower. Norah calls them "little miracles that are happening all around us."

Norah uses and recommends Photoshop Elements to translate her photos into what she feels when she takes the picture. But she says her favorite photos are the ones that are the least processed. Norah has taken some photography classes, but found them limiting to her creativity. She says she learns the most when she just takes her camera and shoots a ton of pictures.

Norah was born in Inkster and has lived in Detroit, Novi and the "white-burgs" before moving to Ann Arbor/Ypsilanti in 2001. She was baptized and raised a Catholic. As a young child, around age 8, Norah says she began to see a disconnect between what she was told to believe and those that were teaching it. She later realized that God, the Universe could be found within oneself; that an outside "authority" was not necessary in order to find one's spiritual path. Norah is grateful for Interfaith and feels we are her true family.

Norah wants us to know that she is AL-WAYS willing to help in any way necessary, each and every one of use. She seems to have an intuitive sense for folks in need.

Save The Date: Community Visioning and CoCreation Conversation: November 18th 10a-2pm

Open House and Welcoming Potluck: September 11th from 6-8pm; opportunity to meet our new members

September Board Meeting: September 17th 1pm-3pm; open to all members **Lauren:** Working on launching a workshop on Teen Meditation; discussing collaboration with the Democratic Party Black Caucus for a "Uncomfortable Conversations" workshop; creating a Women's Group/Circle, many people have expressed interest; organizing a vigil (8/27 4p-5p) at Skate Park as an Interfaith response to the racist graffiti discovered there.

Mary Alice: The Co-Creation Team is on the second step in developing interview guides for the Community Visioning and CoCreation Conversation scheduled for November 18th at 10am. We will be encouraging all members to participate in cocreating the next five, ten, and twenty years at ICSG.

Delyth: Finances: July was an excellent month. We exceeded our monthly goal by \$3k due to a very good yard sale. Café 704 is doing well.

The Kickshaw theatre group (performed at ICSG in early 2016) contacted us about renting space this winter.

She was approached by a few ICSG members about circulating a Gerrymandering Petition at the Center. After much discussion about the bias of our congregation and the apolitical nature of ICSG. Mary Alice made a motion that no petitions be allowed in the Center. Tony seconded and the Board affirmed with no dissent. We ask that members be respectful of the role of ICSG to be a spiritual haven for all, even those with different political opinions than our individual selves.

On September 11th from 6-8pm we will host an open house welcoming new members to the center. Plans are to hold this every other month

Future: Next year is the Center's 20th anniversary. We need to start planning for this now; there are many opportunities to highlight our 20th anniversary throughout the year.

Sally is working on a party with the theme is Roaring Twenties.

The Kickshaw theater group will most likely be partnering with us in January of 2018.

Johanna: We reviewed the findings of She conducted a survey of our membership with 9 questions using the online website Survey Monkey. The responses confirm that we are headed in the right direction with the new changes to our service; more details of what inspired this survey will be in the QCC Highlights. The board discussed the value of this information for the ministerial team during this year of transition.

QCC Highlights July 30th by Mary Alice Truitt

Quarterly Community Conversation is an opportunity for the congregation to discuss and give feedback to the board and the ministerial team. We had lively discussions and ended early. Agenda items are bolded:

Length of Service Readings and Meditations

Craig requested that volunteers be reminded of the time limit for R&M: 3-5 minutes. Because he is recording, editing, and uploading components of our services to YouTube, a consistent time length will be helpful. His suggestion was to practice prior to make sure it will be within the time limit.

Feedback: volunteers need to be more sternly reminded of the time limit; quality over quantity; maybe they could be longer by alternating readings on one sunday, meditations the next.

Length of Namaste as component of Sunday service

This conversation naturally followed the topic of the time limit for readings and meditations. It was suggested that it be lengthened because our congregation is growing and its difficult to get around the chairs. In response it was suggested that namaste be encouraged as silent with socializing out in the hall after service. At this point it was decided that a survey was needed to capture the range of opinions about the service structure and its recent changes.

Update on Community Visioning

Mary Alice provided an update from the CoCreation Team. The CoCreation team are working on a plan for capturing the community's vision of the center over the next five, ten, twenty years. We are em-

phasizing the spiritual priorities of the center in order to guide the leadership during the organization's growth. There will be two community conversations, one in November and another in January. The CoCreation team is using the Appreciative Inquiry Approach to organizational planning; this is noted because it is different than strategic planning initiatives used by many nonprofit organizations. Strategic Planning focuses on what's wrong and how to fix it. Appreciative Inquiry includes everyone in dialogue to identify what it is that we love about the organization and what we dream for its future. The topic of these community visioning conversations: CoCreating A Haven for Spiritual Growth and Rejuvenation.

Update from Caring Committee

A request was made for helping Connie with plumbing. The Caring Committee has been discussing how to limit negative gossip by offering a talking circle in addition to referrals.

20th Anniversary

Lindsey wanted to highlight that next year is ICSG's 20th Anniversary. She encouraged the organization to utilize this moment in our history to build relationships with communities outside of the organization. She suggested themed marketing and an Event. Sally accepted the challenge to plan the event with a team.

Update on Finances

\$5k behind budget; expect yard sale to make a difference but not cover the projected short-fall; this year we've brought in \$8k for the Building Fund, bringing the total to \$15k; A discussion followed about Sunday offerings being crucial to our everyday functions, and perhaps we to improve our online giving. There will be an effort to clarify the different types of Pay-Pal accounts; it was suggested to look into promoting Network for Good to receive online donations.

Updates from Lauren her door is open; the changes in service structure are in pursuit of ending on time; Thank you for your passion

Main Take-aways: Lauren's door is open; Community Visioning and CoCreation discussions will be occurring; a survey will be conducted by Johanna with Survey Monkey to better capture the congregation's opinions about the structure and timing of the Sunday service.

Survey Answers By Johanna Nader

Question 1: Overall, which parts of the survey do you most enjoy: Majority of respondents enjoyed the Message and Special Music the most; followed by Spiritual Reading, Namaste greeting, and Guided Meditation.

Question 2: The service currently lasts 1.5 hours. 2/3 of respondents answered that this was just the right length, while 1/3 said it was too long.

Question 3: Spiritual Readings are typically 2-4 minutes long. A majority of respondents responded that this was a good length (88%). Folks that commented, however, that this time limit was rarely adhered to and felt that it should be.

Question 4: Should Spiritual Readings be related to the Message topic? A majority of respondents, 70%, said "not necessarily."

Question 5: Guided Meditations are typically 2-4 minutes long. 80% of respondents said this time was "just right," as long as the time limit is adhered to.

Question 6: How do you feel about Announcement time limit of 30 seconds? A majority (85%) felt this was just right. Some respondents suggested that longer announcements and details be put into written form on the website, through email or posted on the community room bulletin board.

Question 7: Asked whether the time allotted to the Namaste greeting was "Too Long Too Short or Just Right". The results were not clear cut. 56% thought the time was "just right," while 36% thought the time was "too long." A minority (12%) considered this time to be "too short."

Question 8: Regarding whether Namaste greeting should be silent or quietly social, 66% (2/3) voted for quietly social, while 37% voted for the time to be silent. However, many respondents thought that silent Namaste greeting should occur once per month on First Sunday.

Question 9: Should the entire service be live-streamed on our website? Results were not as clear cut: 45% said "Not sure", 32% said "No", and 23% said "Yes." Most folks seemed to be concerned about privacy during open mic time.
